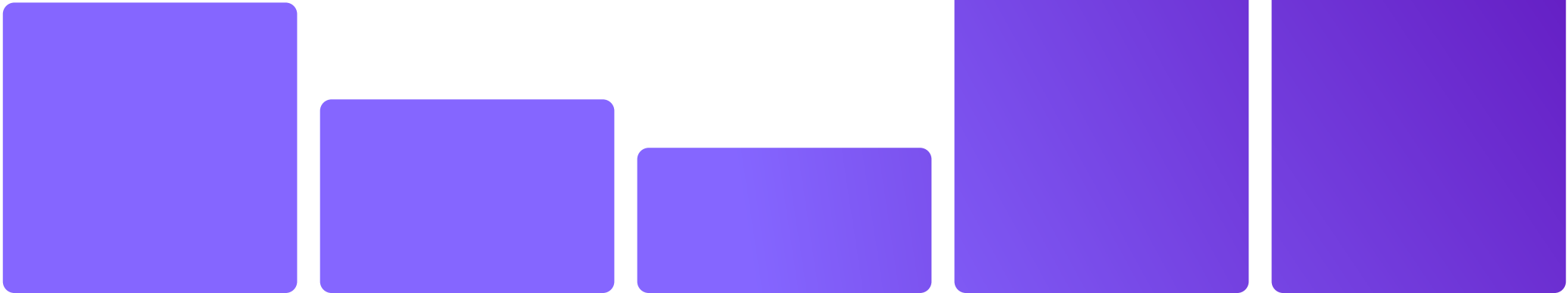

With increased regulatory expectations and significant penalties for non-compliance, many firms are asking the same question: Have we got it right? Presented from the practical perspective of a Compliance Officer in a local accounting firm that has recently navigated the implementation journey, this session moves beyond the legislation to focus on the day-to-day realities of AML compliance for legal and accounting practices. Drawing on practical experience, real-life examples and lessons learned from New Zealand's AML regime, the session will explore common implementation mistakes, effective review processes, practical compliance tips, and what firms should be doing to prepare for Australia's first enforcement actions. Drawing on examples from private businesses, family groups, property investors and primary producers, this presentation will explore how the changes are likely to affect common transactions and planning strategies, highlighting areas where uncertainty remains and where additional care is required. Particular focus will be given to practical implementation issues relevant to Tasmanian practitioners and regional advisers.

With a background in software engineering and extensive experience in business analytics, he brings a unique interdisciplinary perspective to his work.

Felicity Bell is the Deputy Director of the Centre for the Future of the Legal Profession and a Senior Lecturer at UNSW Law & Justice at the University of New South Wales, Sydney, Australia. The Centre engages in research, thought leadership and educational and professional development partnerships with professional regulators and associations, law practices and departments from a range of sectors, and the courts. Felicity is a former lawyer and previously worked for the Tasmanian State Revenue Office. Her current research

deals with innovation and technology (especially artificial intelligence) and their multivariate impacts on lawyers' identity, professionalism, and capacity to improve access to justice. Felicity has published extensively and her work has been widely cited, including in court judgments. She is a co-author of Artificial Intelligence and the Legal Profession (Hart, 2020) and Family Law in Australia (LexisNexis, 2025).

Violet Chen is a Tax Accountant based in Hobart with experience advising individuals and SMEs on Australian taxation matters. She is passionate about making complex tax issues practical and accessible. Violet holds a Bachelor of Economics, a Master of Professional Accounting, an MBA, and is an Associate Member of CPA Australia.

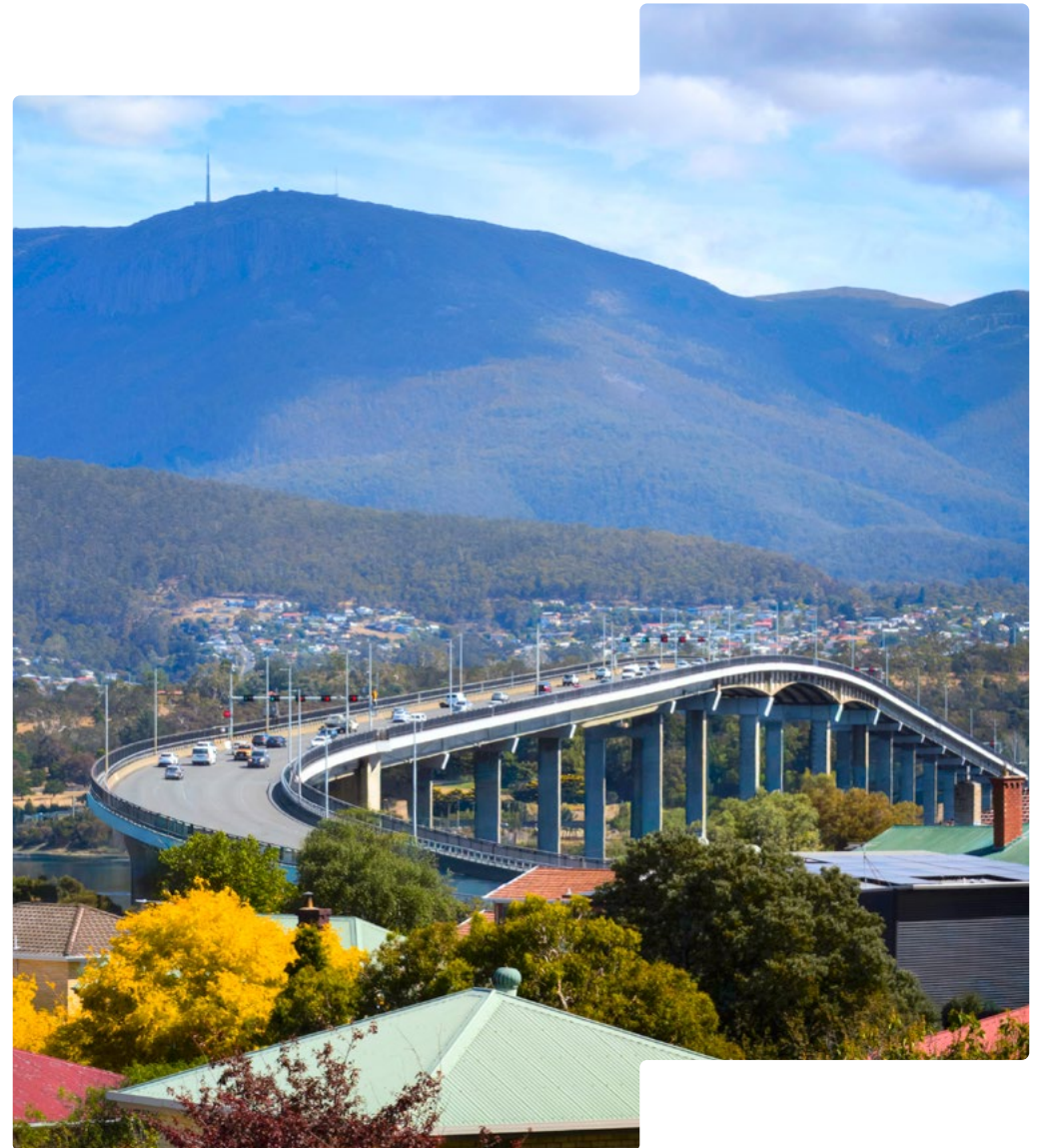
